## Track Overviews

### **Natural Resource Management In A Changing World**

The DoD manages its natural resources to ensure continued access to its land, air and water resources for military training and testing. DoD is a leader in the stewardship of natural resources in its trust, protecting and enhancing these irreplaceable resources for ecological integrity, sustainable yield, scientific research, education, and outdoor recreation. This track will include sessions on strategic planning to support natural resources management and mission needs, determining priorities in a changing world, lessons learned from partnering, and new policies and tools for DoD managers.

### **Heritage Stewardship And Advancing The Mission**

The Department of Defense continues to strive to balance its mission with sound and responsible stewardship of its irreplaceable cultural heritage. Changes in national and international policies, innovative technologies, and advancements in managing the cultural resources portfolio establish this as a challenging time for DoD cultural resources managers (CRM). In order to support the DoD mission, CRM personnel must understand the implications of new laws and the way forward in the arena of international heritage stewardship. CRMs must also creatively align the DoD historic real property portfolio with federal sustainability and energy policies and initiatives. Sessions in this track will examine the policies, procedures and case studies relevant to these emerging issues.

### **Balancing Competing Demands — Environment, Community, And Military**

This track will cover a variety of topics centered on planning and managing range and airspace needs given competing demands driven by environmental, community and military needs. Perspectives from all four Services, applicable to both training and testing, will be presented and discussed through case studies, individual speakers, and panels. Sessions will provide opportunities for dialogue among military stakeholders as well as other interested parties.

### **Meeting Multiple Missions – Coordinated Planning, Collaborative Partnerships**

Ranges and installations are as much a part of the landscape and fabric of the nation as the habitats, working lands, and communities that surround them. They rely on each other for economic, environmental, and social benefits that serve the needs of both interests: military readiness on one hand, and sustainable community development on the other. Coordinated planning at all levels, forged through collaborative partnerships, ensures consideration of all viewpoints. This dynamic, forward-looking approach that provides a solid foundation for making our installations and ranges truly sustainable in the 21st century will be the focus of this track. Collaborative planning and partnership efforts to date will be reviewed and participants will engage in discussion on the future of such collaboration in meeting multiple missions in the face of increasing resource demands and a rapidly evolving military, social, economic, and environmental context.

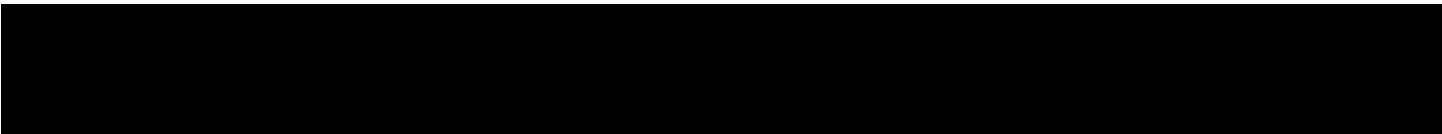

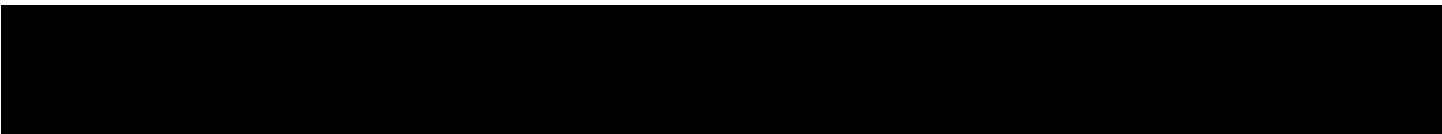

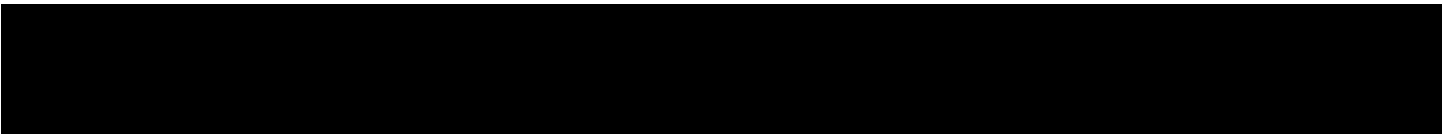
